

2020-2021 - Grace Academy Solihull COVID 19 - Catch up Premium Plan

Overview of Strategy

We intend to use the professional knowledge and expertise in the education system and Grace Academy Solihull (GAS) to ensure that our children recover from any disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19) and get back on track. We also acknowledge that it is likely that disadvantaged and vulnerable groups will have been hardest hit, therefore some of the planned strategies will aim to support these groups specifically.

In line with government expectations below is an outlined plan to support student catch up.

Expected Funding Allocation

In recognition of the impact the coronavirus pandemic has had on the loss of learning of young people in schools, the Secretary of State for Education has announced that our academy will receive a total of £80 per student in years 7 - 11. Based on October census numbers the total is likely to be $838 \times £80 = £67,040$

Though funding has been calculated on a per pupil or per place basis, Grace Academy Solihull will use the sum available to the school as a single total from which to prioritise support for pupils according to their need.

Use of Funds

GAS intends to use the funds to support pupils to catch up for lost teaching over the previous months. It is acknowledged that we have the flexibility to spend the funding in the best way for our cohort and circumstances.

The academy has referred to the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) document (Covid 19 support guide for schools) when agreeing on planned actions to direct the additional funding in the most effective way.
