en adventurous students from Grace Academy have taken up spades and shovels and built two houses for poor families in Mexico with little more than hand tools.

The industrious students raised £1,570 each to go on the eleven-day trip to transform the lives of two Mexican families living without electricity, running clean water, or access to a fridge, car and telephone.

The new 11 feet by 22 feet houses in Tijuana, which have a concrete foundation and stucco-finished exterior, will help to keep families together who cannot provide adequate housing for their children.

Student Jaden Carter said, "Before I went to Mexico I knew very little about poverty but now I understand the extent to which people in poverty live. We were read a poem about lacking, it spoke of how the people where we build the house feel like they don't lack anything. This has stuck with me as in

the western world, we seem to have everything and still want more. I'm very proud to have been a part of Build Hope Mexico 2016 and I'm very proud of what we have accomplished."

The idea behind the 'Build Hope' scheme is to give students the opportunity to experience a new culture, the tools to help them make a difference in the lives of other people in need overseas, and a fresh perspective on life.

Tim Burgum, a teacher from Grace Academy who also went on the trip, said, "The trip to Mexico is a life-changing experience for students who learn about the value of things, and see families with no possessions who are still happy and grateful about everything they do have."







"We would like to congratulate all our students on their achievements this year," said Matt Spina, Assistant Principal for Ethos and Student Life. Speaking about a rise in standards he added, "I think we have seen a real step up in student achievement; as we have raised the bar they have responded. We can't give everyone an award but every student has achieved something this year in terms of postive attitudes, increasing grades or sporting successes. Our message is to keep going, you could achieve outstanding attainment next year."
