MADISON SHERRIFF - YEAR 10 KYLE BAKER - YEAR 10 RAISING FUNDS FOR A DEFIBRILLATOR

Student leaders will be running a number of fundraising activities during the last half term of the year, in an attempt to raise enough money to purchase a community access AED, with the goal of raising around £1,600. An AED – or automated external defibrillator – is a computerised medical device that delivers an electrical current through the chest which aims to shock the heart back into a normal rhythm allowing it to pump again. Rapid response using automated technology can significantly improve the chances of survival for someone in cardiac arrest. An AED is a portable defibrillator especially designed for people with little or no medical background.

"I think it's important for us to get one because there are people in the school with heart problems, but also people in the community. We could be the closest place for people to go in order to get help," said Kyle Baker, Year 10.

"It's beneficial for us to have an AED because we can potentially save people's lives instead of them waiting for the ambulance to arrive, which can often take too long," said Madison Sherriff, Year 10.

Speaking about the importance of encouraging good attendance, IID Form Tutor Steve Bradshaw, said, "Research shows that regular attendance and better grades tend to go hand in hand. To support this the Academy has structured tutor time to be constructive for the student. Besides focusing on attendance (with the students taking ownership of their own attendance graphs), we also cover topics each day such as Ethos, Literacy, and Discovery or Circle Time, with assembly on Fridays.

The idea behind the scheme is to identify community projects that local businesses could be involved in, helping them to make a positive impact on the Chelmsley Wood area and beyond.

JUDE HUMPHRIES COVER STORY

As the Academy continues to top the league tables in North Solihull, combined with being rated as 'Good' with 'Outstanding' aspects by Ofsted, we are now the school of choice for a record number of up to 190 new Year 7 students in September this year.

The Ofsted result is just one more step towards us giving better life chances to local students. One of our top priorities is to make sure that the transition to our Academy from local feeder primary schools is as easy as possible, both academically and socially.

Our teaching is based on differentiation and designed to get the best out of each individual child. This means that while Year 7 students are initially put into sets for some subjects when they first arrive, they are continually assessed and moved between sets if required.

As soon as we know our in-take of students, we visit all our local primary schools because we think it is crucial that we get to know our new students face to face. This is followed up with our induction day in the summer term when Year 6 students are invited to come and get a taste of how the Academy works.

Head of Transition, Jude Humphries, explained: "The key to successful transition is knowing the systems in advance, and knowing who you can go to if you need help. We tell new students exactly what happens on their first day in advance so they feel safe and secure. Taster days help students to get to know our staff, understand our rules and expectations, and learn simple things such as daily routines, where to line up, and how to get here. They even get to see their Year 7 dining room which is a safe zone just for them.

"We also put students in tutor groups on our induction day so they can meet the children they are going to be with when they get here on their first day. We spend a huge amount of time researching who their friends are so they get to be with friends they know, but also make new ones too.

"We always do an assembly in the first couple of weeks where the new students are presented with a special Grace Academy pen, and parents are also invited so they have the opportunity to meet the staff of the Academy over coffee."

The Academy's summer school for students helps those who may need extra support in the transition process. Within the first two weeks of coming to the Academy students are also invited to take part in a team-building weekend at Whitmore Lakes, where they learn more about the Academy's ethos and key values of Grace, Respect, Integrity, Potential, and Excellence.

We look forward to welcoming our new students in September!

SCIENCE IN FOCUS

Targeted revision sessions, separate coursework days, and holiday sessions, have secured excellent progress for students in Science, with 50% of students expected to achieve A* to A grades in the Triple Science Award at the end of the academic year.

By having targeted intervention groups with top performing students, and separate tutor groups and intervention for Year 11s, our pupil premium students are closing the gap in terms of their performance compared to other students.

Explaining the department's focus on doing things a bit differently, Emily Sumerling, Joint Head of Science, said, "We have incorporated new, lecture-style revision sessions for students with hand-outs and interactive practical sessions like dissection, helping students to learn in a more 'hands-on' way.

"There is a big focus on gifted and talented (G&T) students across the Year groups, with an emphasis on differentiation and getting the best out of every child. The new system of evaluation in Key Stage 4 called Progress 8, means that every individual grade matters, rather than focussing on wider level boundaries. A new challenge of 'Life Without Levels' at KS3, has energised us and we're excited about the system which is helping us to raise standards all the time."

Among the extra-curricular projects our G&T students have been involved in this year are a STEM challenge in which our Year 9 students won the regional final, and a group of our students attended a day event at Solihull College in March to learn more about sustainability and conservation.

The Academy's eco-site provides students with an excellent introduction to Science and the opportunity to learn outside the classroom. Emily said, "Last year the site produced so much produce that the canteen used some in their food. The students also won the 'Solihull in Bloom' bronze award for their recycled greenhouse, a project which helped us to incorporate nature and



conservation into the school curriculum. The students learn so much better outside and really enjoy the eco-site which enables us to teach conservation, ecosystems, lifecycles and plants in a hands-on and engaging way, putting the subjects into context for students."

Emily Sumerling explained that the department is trying to excite younger Year 5 students in Science as well, encouraging them to visit Grace Academy and take part in exciting experiments they wouldn't otherwise get the opportunity to see. Emily said, "We set up our own planetarium and took 70 Year 5 students from our feeder schools for a walk through the solar system so they could learn how it was formed. Other subjects we have covered with Year 5 G&T students are microscopy, human anatomy, circuits and respiration."



Speaking about the strength of the Science Department, Emily added, "We have a very strong, dedicated team with loads of enthusiasm and skills, and a love of their subject. We are committed to engaging students through a variety of activities to get the best out of every child at every stage of their learning."
